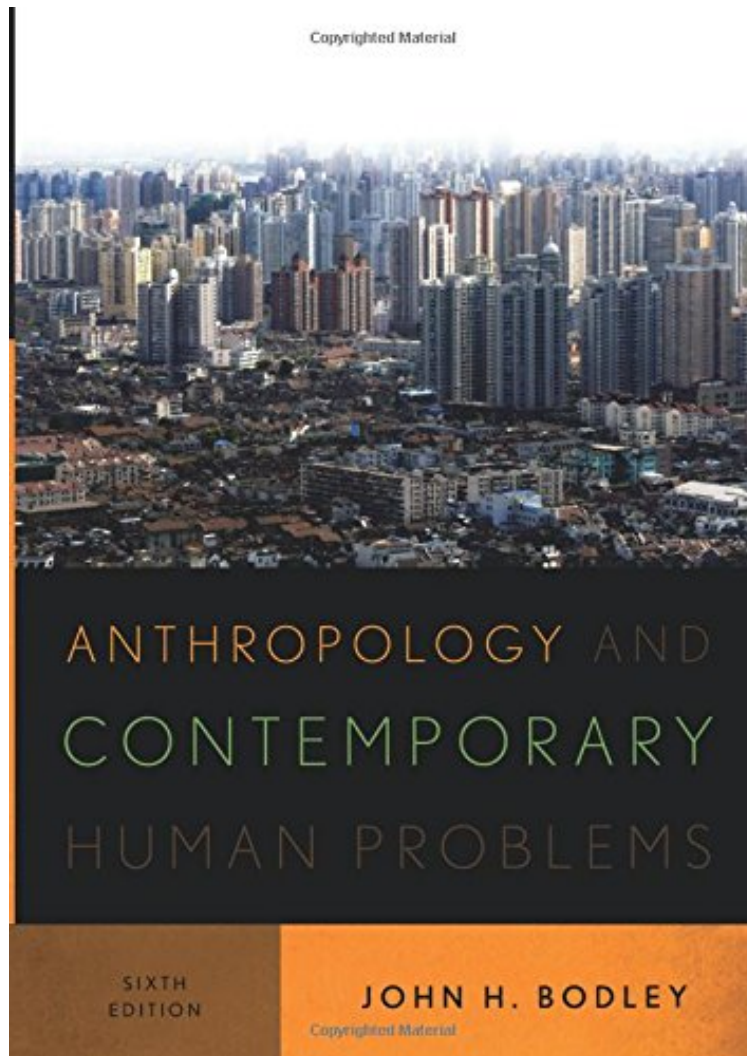

In my class we skipped around a little in the book, so I did not have to read all the chapters. I was very unhappy to find that there is no way to move from chapter to chapter other than thumbing through every page and setting bookmarks manually for each chapter. There is no table of contents containing links to the individual parts of the book as are found in other e-textbooks I have purchased. Very inconvenient.Also, though it is possible to change the size of the text, it is not possible to change the font. The default font is a sans-serif that I

found difficult to read. Another note and this is for all textbooks. No page numbers! I understand that since the font can be set the pages are malleable but there has to be some way to number them! Citing books for research papers requires the use of page numbers, which means I have to borrow someone's book when I am writing.
