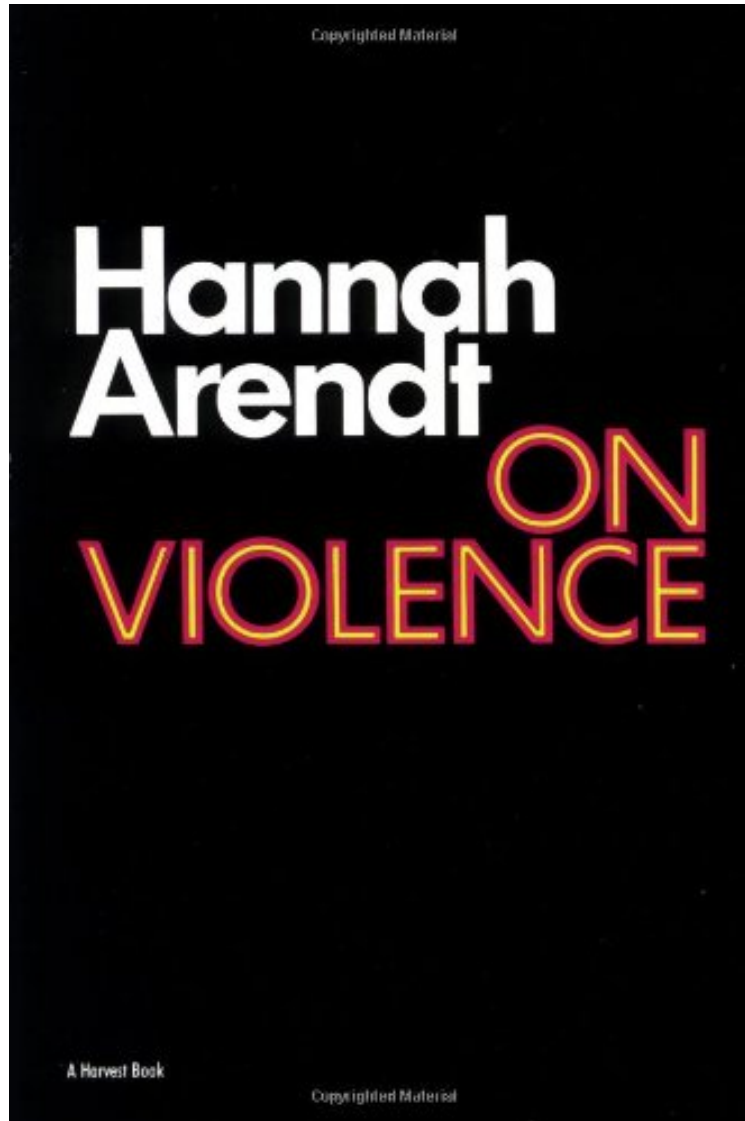

Hannah Arendt is an American philosopher whose most famous work is probably "Eichman in Jerusalem". This book discusses the difference between Violence and Power, where Violence has the ability to make other obey you.
