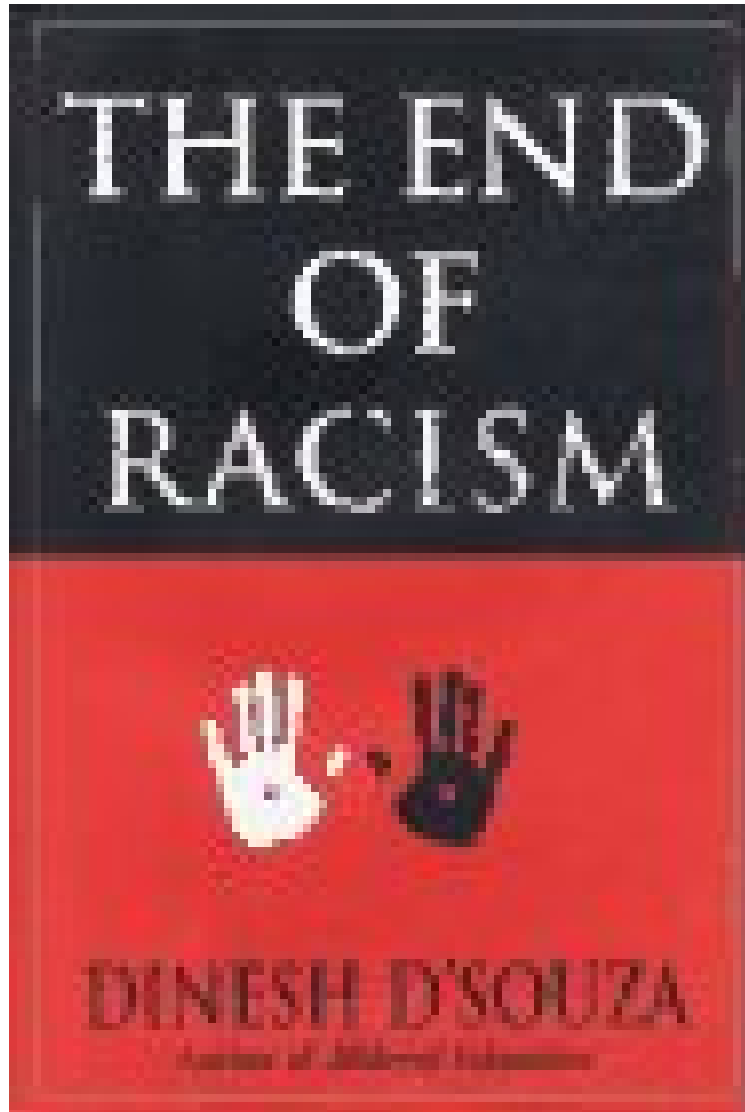

If you are willing to take a clear-headed, scholarly, unsentimental look at those issues that the media and literati have come to accept as axiomatic, this despite empirical and historical evidence to the contrary, The End of Racism will enthrall

you. It took a lot of guts to write this book. Race is the 3d rail of politics in America and unless you accept, without question and without reservation, the basic tenets of the Civil Rights movement, you are considered "insensitive," or, at worst, a "racist." Mr. D'Souza systematically, and with erudition, challenges this worldview head on. This book is chock-full of thought-provoking perspectives, not the least of which is the distinction between racism and ethnocentrism. Relying on the abundant historical record, D'Souza buttresses his assertion, which winds up striking at the heart of the Civil Rights-Leftist-Multiculturalis canard that racism was responsible for slavery, ergo, reparations are in order. D'Souza is not without his critics, who run the gamut from the scholarly, to the demagogic. Still, don't let this scare you from reading this book. D'Souza is no race-baiter by any means. His look at race and culture in America is unsentimental and clear-headed.
