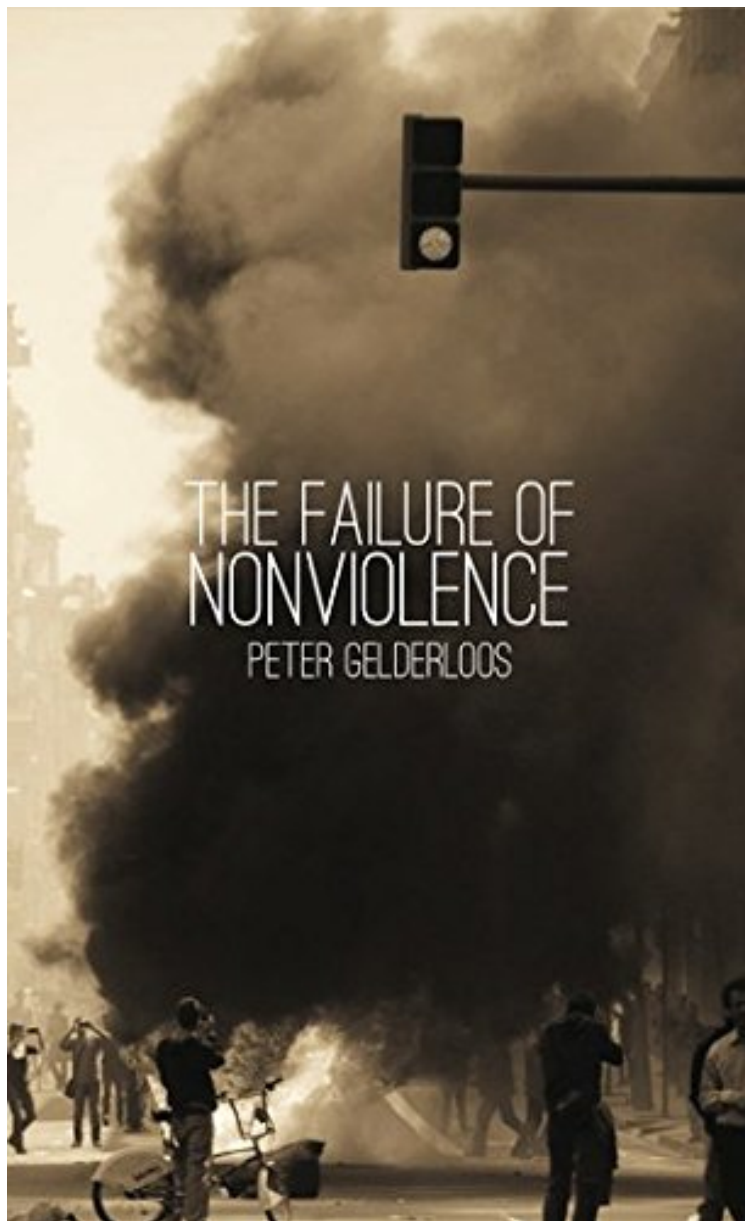

Puposky Peter Gelderloos knocked another one out the park with his latest book, Failure of Nonviolence: From the Arab Spring to Occupy. For anyone who's read his earlier How Nonviolence Protects The State, the more recent book might seem like a follow-up. Failure of Nonviolence does contain commentary on the earlier book in a nice little bonus section towards the end. However, Failure of Nonviolence feels far more like a follow-through than follow-up on the ideas Gelderloos initially presented in How Nonviolence Protects The State. Gelderloos explores the idea of nonviolence as a tool of State-ist repression and co-option of social movement far more deeply, and delves into more recent examples like the plaza occupation movement of Spain and Greece and the Occupy movement in the USA.
